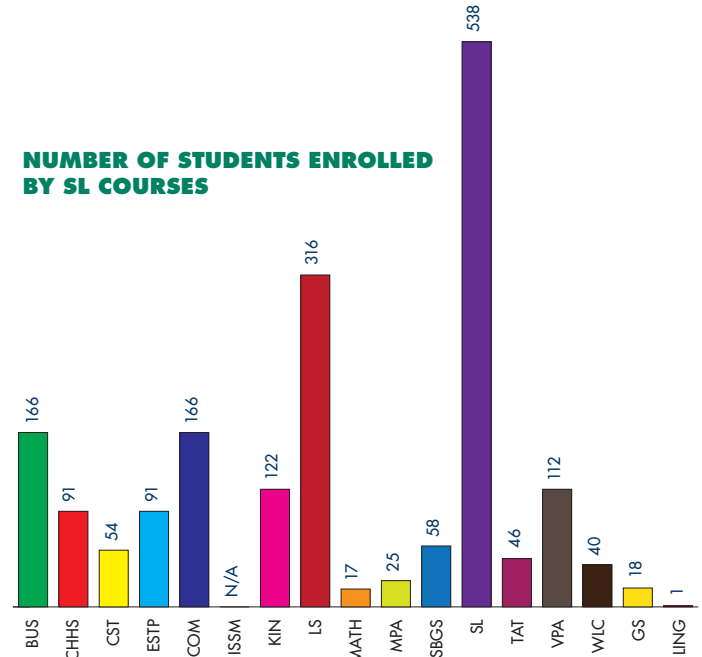
During the 2009 – 2010 academic year, **1,851 students** in 54 courses provided **59,920 hours of service** in community agencies and schools. Students were placed in 166 community partners in Fall 2009 and 149 community partners in Spring 2010. **The monetary value of this service to the community, calculated with the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service, totals \$1,249,332.**

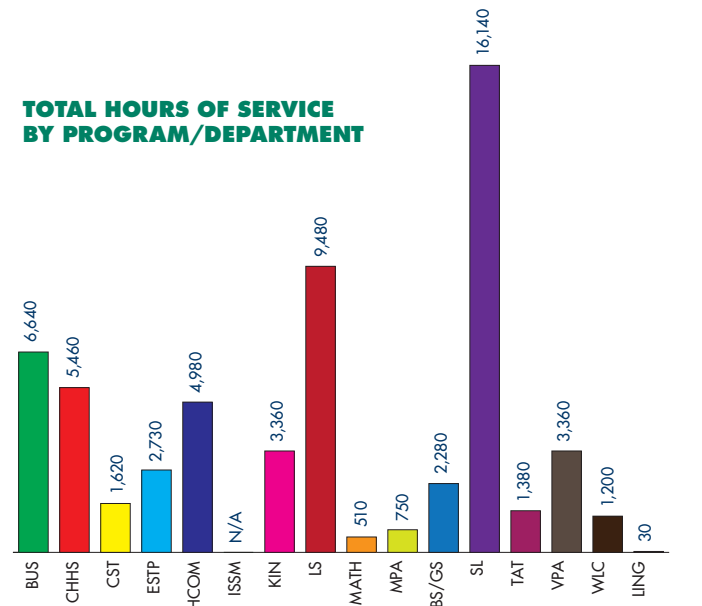
